


Illustration of the Washington Oaks Historic District

# Washington Oaks Historic District

The Young Home

*It was a signal milestone when, on September 30, 2009, Washington Oaks was added to the National Register of Historic Places. These sites tell the story of America. Here is a portion of our story:*

Washington Oaks Historic District lies entirely within the boundaries of Washington Oaks Gardens State Park in Flagler County, Florida. A pristine example of old Florida, the park spans 425 acres, from the Atlantic Ocean beach with significant coquina rock outcroppings, and then moves inland across coastal scrub, hammock and maritime forest, to the Matanzas River. This area was inhabited by Native Americans 12,000 years ago. Europeans arrived in the late 1500s and finding no gold or youth restoring water, those who stayed turned to growing sugar cane and indigo.


The first owner of this property was Spanish General Joseph Hernandez and was part of his Bell Vista Plantation. A later owner was George L. Washington, a relative of the first United States President. In 1936, Louise P. Clark acquired the land as a gift from her soon-to-be husband, Owen D. Young, who was chairman of the board of General Electric and founder of the Radio Corporation of America (RCA). They named the property "Washington Oaks" and for thirty years it was their winter home. In 1964, after Owen's death, Louise donated the grounds to the Florida Park Service.

In 1998, a few local residents founded the "Friends of Washington Oaks Gardens" taking a step that combined their love of the park with their goal to assist in preserving, protecting, promoting, and interpreting the park for the benefit of the public.


The Friends quickly identified needed enhancements to the park and recognized the need for financial resources as well.
